

Wearing my school uniform

Reader Notes:

These stories have been designed to help children learn about school so they know what to expect and can learn positive ways to respond to new situations. As a teacher, parent or carer you can help your child by reading through the stories. You could point out how the child's school experience is different and similar to that in the story and come up with other positive ways to respond. We hope these stories can make children feel more confident, safe and accepted at school.

When I go to school I need to wear my school uniform.

Most kids wear uniforms to show what school they attend.

A school uniform can help me feel like I belong because everyone is wearing similar clothes.

The colours of my school uniform are blue and yellow but other schools might have different coloured uniforms.



There might be a summer and a winter school uniform. This keeps us cool in summer and warm in winter.

When it's summer I will wear my school shorts and my t-shirt. I will need to wear my hat outside so I don't get sunburnt.

When it's winter I will wear my school jumper and long pants.





On special days, like free dress day or costume day during Book Week, we don't wear our school uniform. We might wear our normal clothes or dress-up as story characters instead!



Sometimes I wish I didn't have to wear my school uniform.

But I can remember that my school uniform is comfortable and easy to play in and that all kids at my school need to wear their uniforms, just like me.
